Stanford Basic income Lab (BIL)

In Feb 2017, I founded a research center on campus called the Stanford Basic Income Lab (BIL). The lab seeks to provide academic research on how to design a universal basic income and how to evaluate its implementation: assessing the visions that underpin unconditional cash, the political and economic feasibility of various proposals, as well as its strength and weaknesses as a measure to alleviate poverty, precariousness and inequalities. BIL stimulates research on UBI, advises those developing UBI policies and carrying out UBI experiments, aggregates and disseminates research findings, and convenes scholars, policy makers, and leaders in business, think tanks, nonprofits, and foundations around the philosophy, politics and economics of UBI.
